Dr. Moss is an anthropological archaeologist who studies the long term history of Native American and First Nations of the Northwest Coast of North America, with a special focus on Tlingit and Haida and their ancestors. Her current field and laboratory research in southeast Alaska concerns how use of animal resources is foundational to the cultural identity and heritage of indigenous groups, and how zooarchaeology can contribute knowledge to improve fish and wildlife management and simultaneously support Alaska Native in their contemporary subsistence practices.

Dr. Moss also serves as Curator of Zooarchaeology for the University of Oregon Museum of Natural and Cultural History and maintains a comparative collection of North Pacific specimens in the Department of Anthropology.
